about the foundation

The Canadian Rural Revitalization Foundation/Fondation canadienne pour la revitalisation rurale (CRRF/FCRR) was established in 1989 to contribute to the revitalization and sustainability of rural Canada through collaborative research for rural leaders in the community, private sector, and in all levels of government.

CRRF/FCRR works to create credible insights and to improve our understanding of issues and opportunities that are of common interest to rural residents across Canada. Knowledge and better understanding are the fundamental pillars for the welfare of rural communities and environments.

CRRF/FCRR is an organization comprised of members from across Canada, with diverse international links, representing rural leaders, rural organizations, development practitioners, government policy makers, researchers, students, and other stakeholders interested in the future of rural Canada. The Foundation explores a diversity of issues, including rural health and social provision, local and regional economic development, local government and community governance, education, organization development, environmental management and stewardship, and many others facets of life and livelihood in rural Canada. Each year CRRF/FCRR co-hosts a national confer-

ence to share lessons learned, research findings, and discuss key rural issues. In addition to the national conference, CRRF hosts and participates in workshops, forums, and symposia to advance rural issues in Canada.

Originally known as the Agricultural and Rural Restructuring Group (ARRG), CRRF/FCRR is a national nonprofit society chartered in the Province of Alberta (#50509014) and a federally registered charity (892810763 RR0001).

research activities

Over the past year, CRRF/FCRR has supported and been actively involved in a number of research initiatives of interest to rural audiences. We provided letters of support for 13 proposed initiatives. A selection of research initiatives we are currently involved in are illustrated below.

Building the Future? Rural Infrastructure and Regional Economic Development

Lead: Ryan Gibson (University of Guelph)

This exciting and collaborative project is examining the capacity of different rural communities to respond to infrastructure pressures and how responses will impact economic development in the short and long term. Health & Shared Prosperity

Lead: Lois Berry and Heather Exner-Pirot (University of Saskatchewan)

This initiative, funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada will support the 2018 annual CRRF conference, in collaboration with the University of Saskatchewan and the Saskatchewan Economic Development Alliance. Prairie Drainage Governance

Lead: Phil Loring (University of Guelph/University of Saskatchewan)

This research examines the complex social, economic, and environmental factors associated with agricultural wetland drainage on the Canadian Prairies. Making a Difference? Measuring Outcomes of Provincial Rural Policies and Programs

Lead: Ryan Gibson (University of Guelph)

This research initiative will examine how provinces across Canada have defined rural development policies/ programs, designed new initiatives, and evaluated their success. The mandate of this initiative is to provide evidence-based recommendations for designing, implementing, and evaluating successful rural development policies and programs. Rural Routes: Creating Audio Knowledge

Lead: Bojan Fürst (Memorial University)

Rural Routes is a radio show and a podcast that asks: "What is rural in the 21st century?" Now in its second season, the Rural Routes audio program provides a knowledge mobilization and development support communications vehicle for researchers and community champions, policy makers, rural residents, and social and economic development practitioners interested in a wide range of rural issues. Rural Policy Learning Commons

Lead: Bill Ashton (Brandon University)

The Rural Policy Learning Commons (RPLC) is a 7-year Partnership project established in 2014 to enhance Canadian prosperity by: (i) identifying and analyzing policy options relevant to rural and northern places, (ii) evaluating these options in the context of national and international policy innovations, and (iii) building leadership capacity among rural and northern researchers, policy-makers, and practitioners. This year CRRF and RPLC established an Alliance Committee dedicated to collaborative initiatives and establishing legacy projects. 2017-2018 key activities

At any given point in time CRRF has 10 or more committees dedicated to a wide range of topics and activities (e.g., communication, membership). The work of these committees is critical to CRRF, helping us engage and build our membership, make connections with other organizations, and create and share knowledge. The following are some examples of activities led by our committees over the past year.

Rural Plenary: 2018 Federation of Canadian Municipalities Annual Conference

Thanks to the efforts of the Strategic Partnerships and Networking committee, CRRF President Sarah-Patricia Breen was invited to speak as part of a panel of experts discussing new tools for innovation for rural communities. She was joined by Leon de Vreede (Sustainability Planner, Town of Bridgewater, NS), Dr. Guillaume Charbonneau (President, The College of Family Physicians of Canada), Darice Carlson (CAO, Town of Hanley, SK), and Vicki Blanchard (Economic Development Manager, Municipality of Sioux Lookout, ON). Broadband Connectivity in Rural Canada

This joint submission to the House of Commons Standing Committee on Industry, Science, and Technology was a collaborative effort between CRRF, the Rural Development Institute at Brandon University, and the Rural Policy Learning Commons. Spearheaded by the CRRF/RPLC Alliance, this submission drew attention to broadband in rural Canada, needs, opportunities, and challenges.

Led by the Policy and Advocacy committee, planning began in 2018 for the third iteration of the State of Rural Canada, this time with a focus on rural data, including gaps and challenges. The New Research Forum provides an opportunity for new researchers, community development practitioners, and policy makers to create networks, discuss research method issues, and build skills and capacities.
