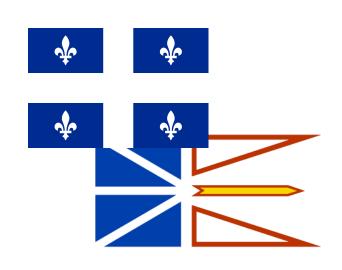

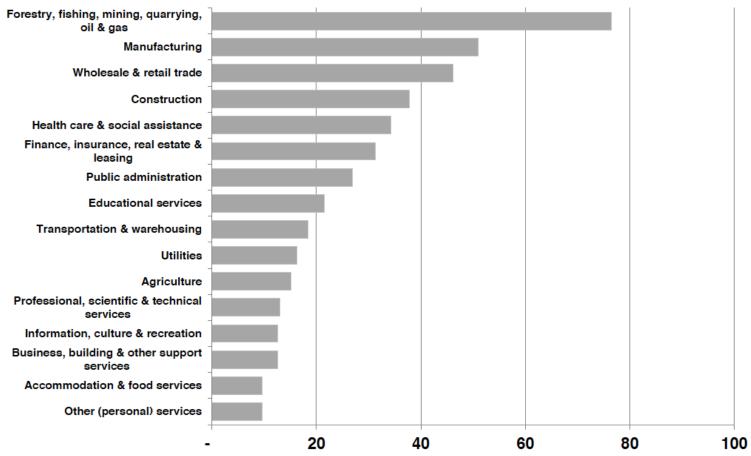

Approximate gross domestic product in non-metro areas¹, \$billion, Canada, 2010

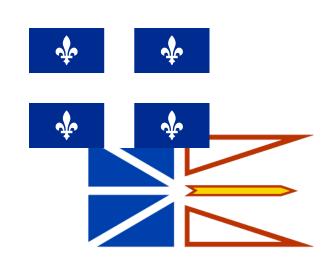

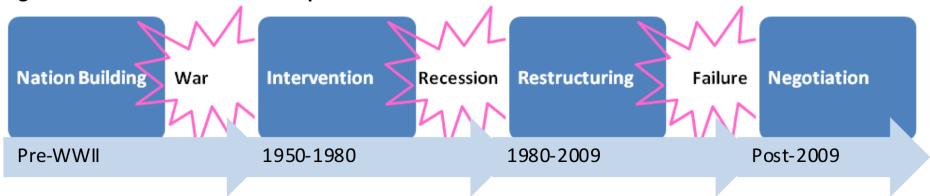

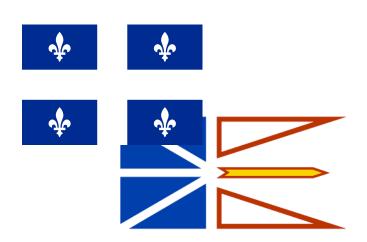

- Wider, deeper, faster connections



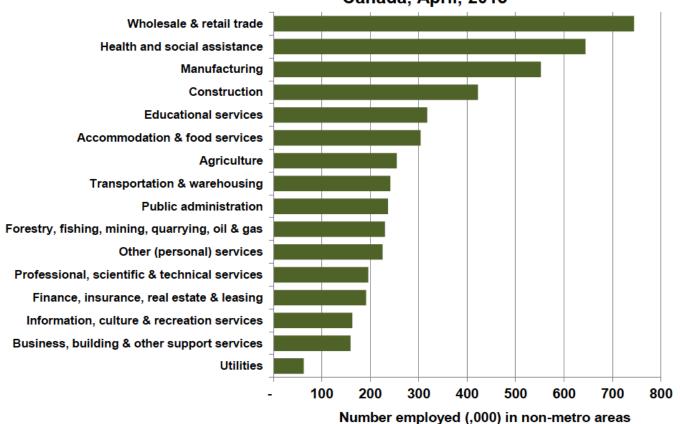

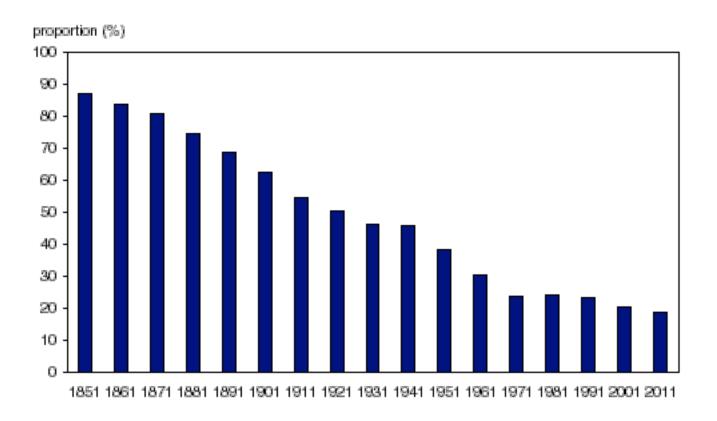

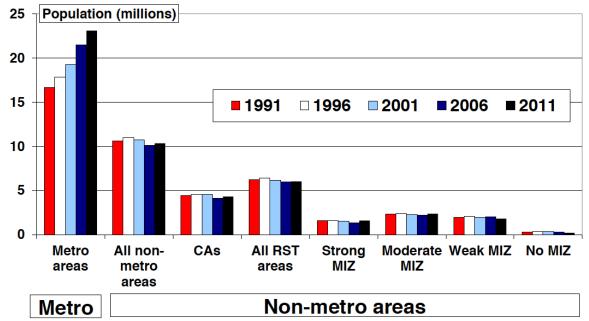
Proportion of the population living in rural areas, Canada, 1851 to 2011
